Why Study This Course?

Psychology lessons are very interesting and incorporate a range of interactive and innovative teaching and learning strategies.

What You'll Study

- Paper 1 (Introductory topics in psychology – A-level) – In your first year you will learn about the topics of memory, social influence, attachment and psychopathology.
- Paper 2 (Psychology in context – A-level) – In your first year you will learn about various different approaches to explaining human behaviour (e.g., biological, cognitive and behaviourist) you will also develop knowledge on psychopathology and research methods.

You will carry out your own research on human behaviour as part of this unit. In your second year you will learn about biopsychology and two other approaches to behaviour – psychodynamic and humanistic.

- Paper 3 (Issues and Options in Psychology – A-Level only) – In the final unit you will study a range of issues and debates in psychology, such as gender and culture bias, the nature-nurture debate and free will and determinism.

You will also study 3 optional topics which are likely to include relationships (what affects our attraction towards someone, how relationships form, why do some people become stalkers for celebrities), schizophrenia (what are the causes and treatments) and forensic psychology (what are the explanations of criminality and how effective are the methods at dealing with offenders).

Career Progression

Studying Psychology will open up lots of options for you:

- Some of our students go on to study Psychology at university.
- Careers in Psychology (e.g. clinical psychology, educational psychology, health psychology, forensic psychology, sport psychology, counselling).
- Teaching and research.
- You do not have to follow a career in psychology just because you have taken the A-Level. Psychology is useful in many other careers because it develops a number of transferable skills. It links well to law, social work, the police, childcare, personnel work, the media, management, advertising, medicine, nursing and health professions.


